Translator's notes:

In Argentina, universities use the Continental education system, which differs greatly with the other two systems in the world, the Anglo-Saxon and the Scandinavian systems. The lack of equivalence for the different degrees requires an explanation of the educational system so that there might not be confusions further ahead in the translation. Please, take a moment to read these notes before reading the actual content of this report.

1. University system: The university system is divided into three units: Undergraduate, graduate and postgraduate courses.

1.1 Undergraduate courses: They usually last between two and three years and students receive an associate degree on a specialized field. Graduates of these courses are Advanced Technicians.

1.2 Graduate courses: These courses usually last between four and six years.

Licentiate course: Students receive a Licentiate degree on a specialized subject, such as Translation, Engineering, etc. The course is equivalent to an American or European undergraduate degree plus a Master's degree in the field according to the equivalences set forth by the Bologna process. Graduates usually write a small research paper at the end of the course, but not as comprehensive as a thesis.

Licentiate cycle: Students who hold an undergraduate degree may apply for a Licentiate cycle course in order to obtain a Licentiate degree on a related field. Graduate courses offer an intermediate degree, which is equivalent to an associate degree. At the end of the course, graduates receive a licentiate degree.

1.3 Postgraduate courses: These include Master's degrees, specializations and doctorates. In order to access a postgraduate course in Argentina, students must have successfully completed a graduate course. A Specialist's degree course is one year long, a Master's degree course is 2 years long, and a doctorate is 4 or 5 years long.

2. Students: Students in Argentina may comply with each of the subject course's requirements for passing courses in three different ways:

2.1 Good Standing Students meet an attendance and score in midterms criteria set forth by the university. At the end of the term, they sit for exams like any other students in the world.

2.2 Long distance Students take an online course on the Virtual Campus. They are considered Good Standing students. At the end of the term, they can sit for exams as any other student.

2.3 External Students have failed to meet the attendance and score in midterms criteria set forth by the university or have chosen to not take the course and its midterm exams and only sit for the final exam.

3. Good Standing Students at a University level: At a global university level, a student may no longer be a good standing student of the university should one or more of the following situations occur:

- A student fails to pass two subject courses per year without an appropriate justification

- It's been two years since the student took any subject courses and they have not complied with the full program requirements for graduation

- The student has failed 4 subject courses while not having passed at least two courses

Should a student lose their good standing status, they need to be re-enrolled. This might entail applying for re-enrollment or sitting for an admission exam if the loss of this status occurred over three years before applying to be re-enrolled.

4. Professors and instructors

4.1 Requirements to become a professor by rank:

- Full professor: A full professor must have a Master's degree or have an equivalent merit, updated knowledge on the field and a prominent professional, scientific, humanistic or artistic activity.

The minimum work experience in academic or professional fields must be 15 years.

- Associate professor: An associate professor must have completed a licentiate course or have an equivalent merit, updated knowledge on the field and a prominent professional, scientific, humanistic or artistic activity. The minimum work experience in academic or professional fields must be 10 years.
- Adjunct professor: An assistant professor must have completed a licentiate course and must have a minimum work experience in academic or professional fields of 15 years.
- Practical work Instructor in Chief: This type of instructor is the head of the auxiliary teaching staff. They are professors in charge of designing and delivering lectures on practical work. Candidates for this position must have graduated at least two years before applying for the position.
- Assistant Instructor: Graduate students assisting the Practical work Instructor in Chief on a variety of tasks. Candidates must be graduates from a licentiate course or any undergraduate course in a related field.

4.2 Types of professor contracts:

- Tenured: Tenured professors have undergone a tender and opposition process. They are appointed by the University Council. They have the right to participate of the university government and the union, and they are active employees.
- Temporary: Acting professors have an effective employment relationship, but they do not have the same rights a tenured professor has.
- By contract: Hired professors enjoy this position for a set limit of time. They do not have the same rights a tenured professor has.

4.3 Types of professor by working time:

- Full time: Professors that work in the university forty hours or more a week. Generally, they combine teaching and research, or carried out academic management activities.
- Part time: Professors that work in the university twenty hours

a week, they frequently focus more on teaching.

- Simple part time: Professors that work in the university only ten hours a week. Commonly, they develop teaching activities and they extraordinarily do research.
- Less hours than simple: Professors that work in the university less than ten hours a week. Usually, they are by contract professors who teach certain topic during a short time.

5. Other Terms

5.1 Academic department: This term comprises all departments that have a systematic academic orientation of the teaching, research and cooperation activities by grouping related disciplines and through the communication between teachers and students of different courses, thus providing more cohesion to the university structure to achieve the optimal use of resources and efforts.

5.2 Technology linkage and transfer office: Science, technology and innovation interface unit which purpose is to enable the connection between agents by identifying the technological needs of socio-economic sectors and looking for solutions in science and technology institutions to provide companies and organizations with technological transference. The purpose of these offices is to foster the generation of knowledge and its application. This is the way these offices participate on the innovation systems process and contribute to increasing the use and application of R+D research results by society, especially in the manufacturing sector, thus fostering the country's competitiveness.

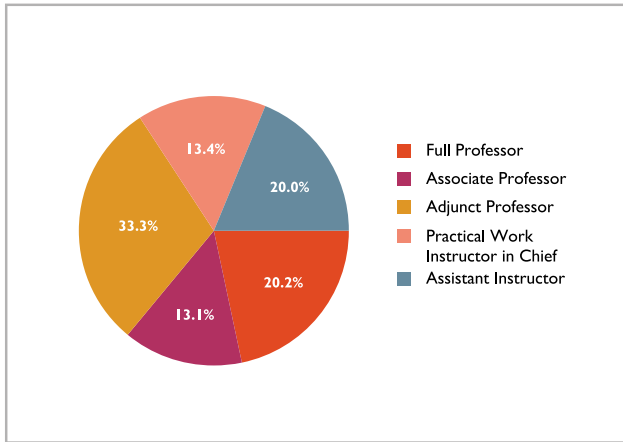

Graph 1: Teaching and research academic personnel distribution by category. Year 2019.

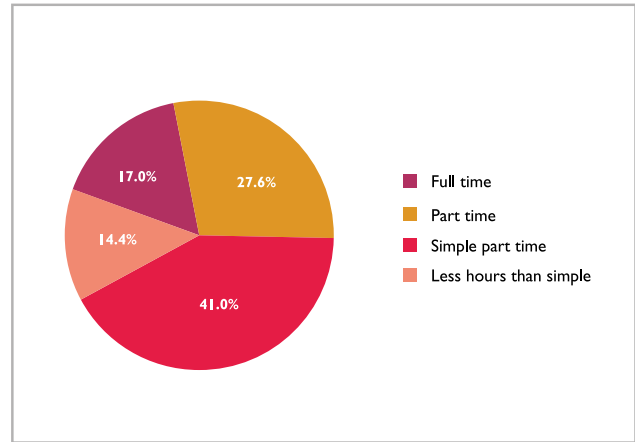

Graph 2: Teaching and research personnel sorted by research load allocation. Year 2019.

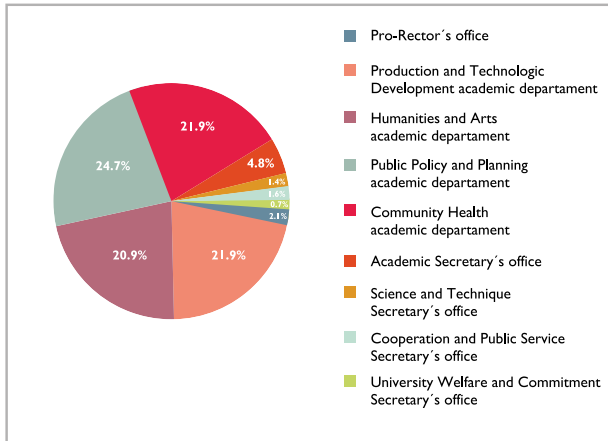

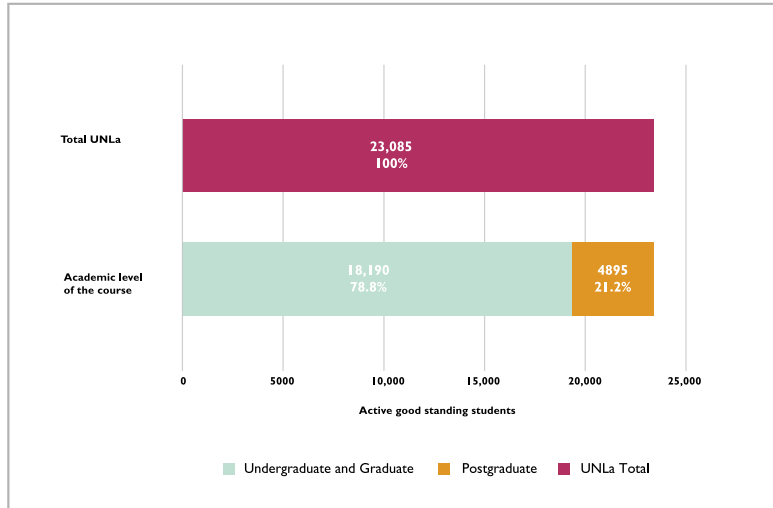

Graph 4: Amount of active good standing students and their distribution by course academic level¹. Year 2019.

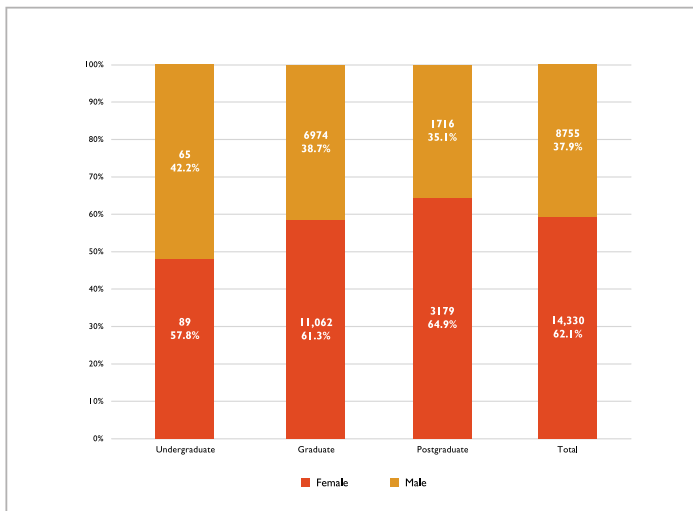

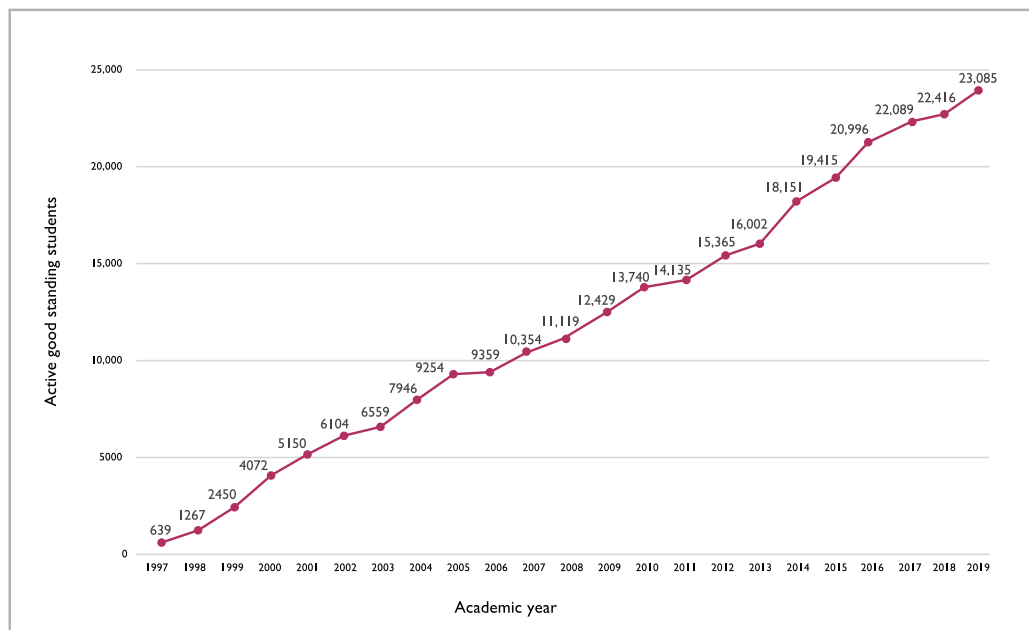

Graph 6: Amount of active good standing students by academic year. Years 1997-2019.

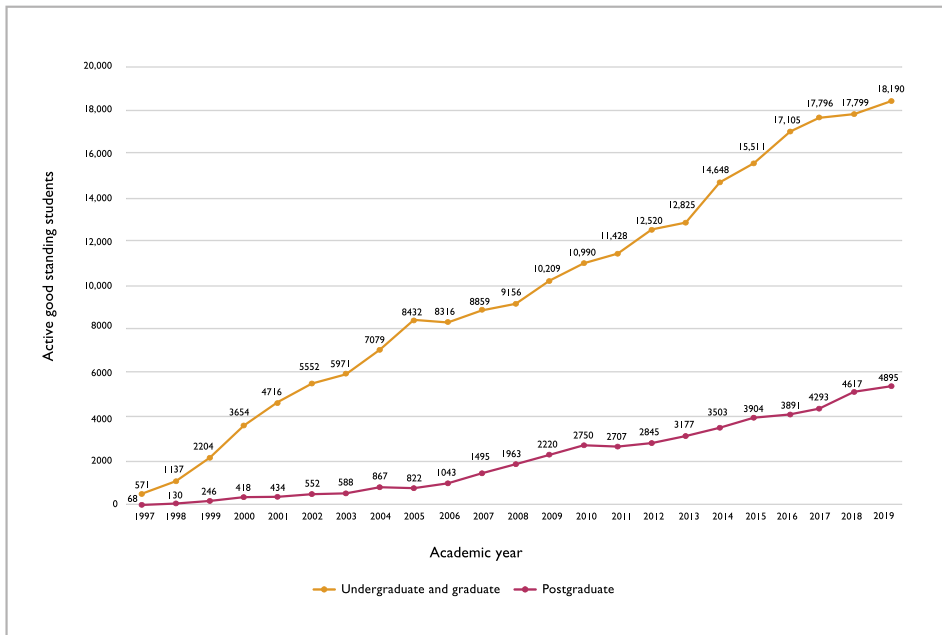

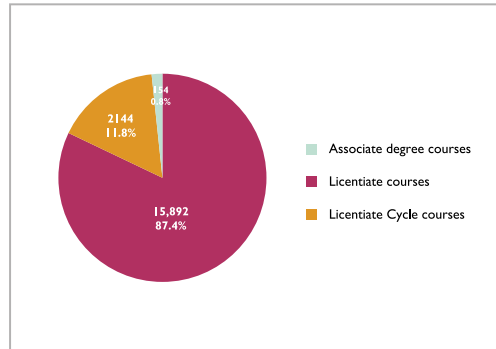

Graph 8: Distribution of undergraduate and graduate students by type of course. Year 2019.

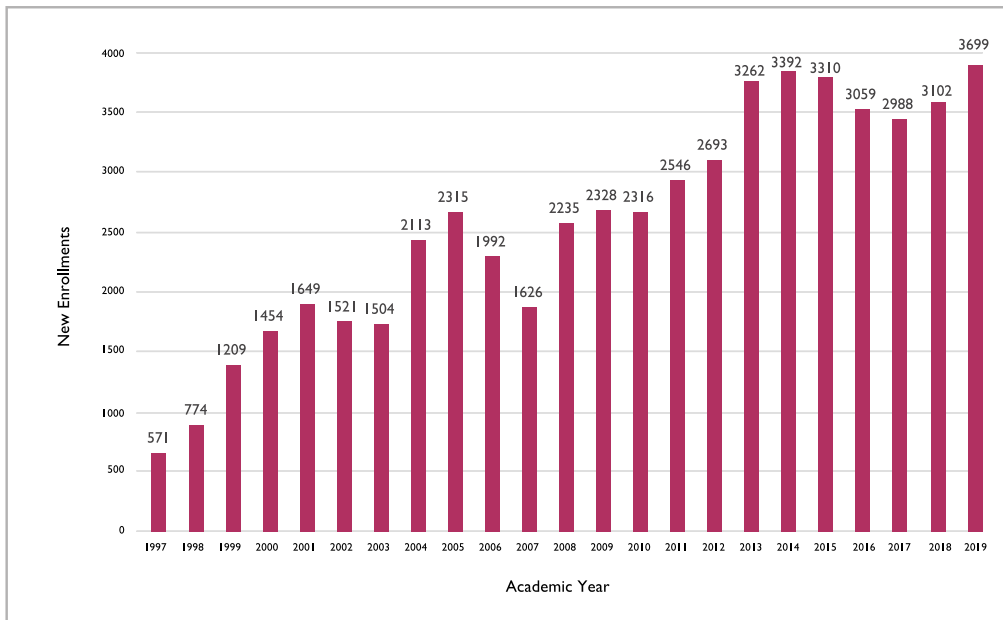

Graph 9: Amount of students' new enrollments to undergraduate and graduate courses¹ by academic year. Years 1997-2019.



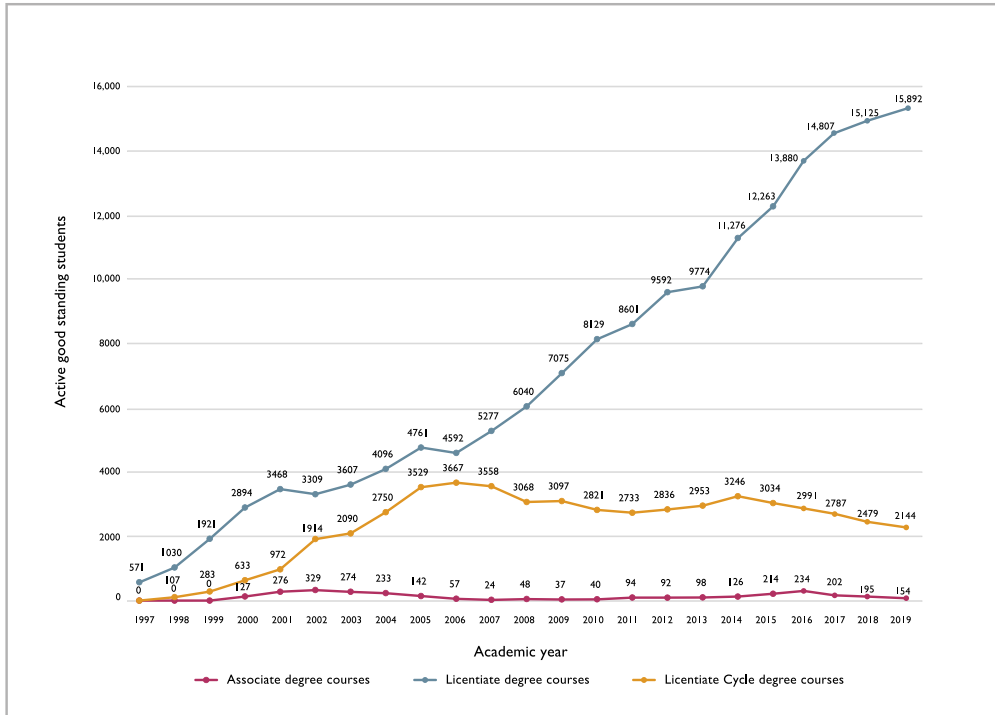

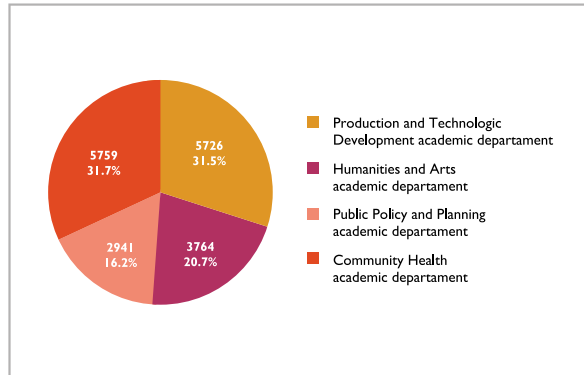

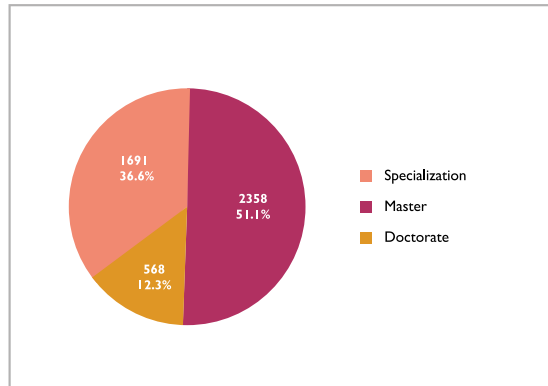

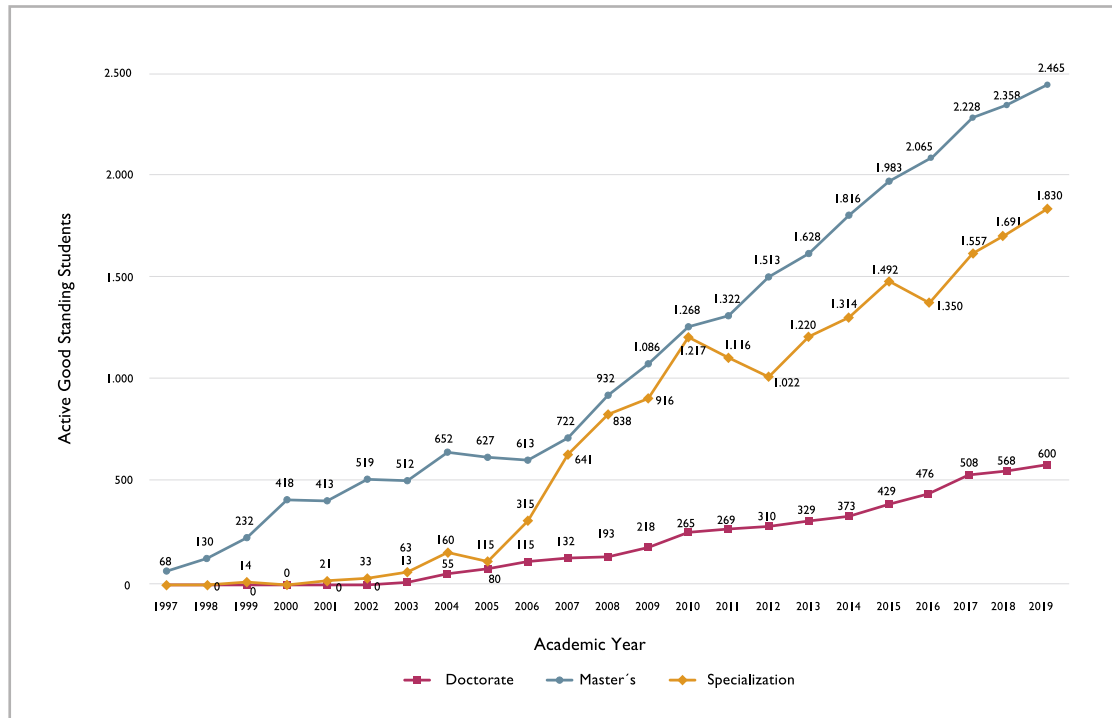
Graph 12: Distribution of postgraduate students by type of course. Year 2019.

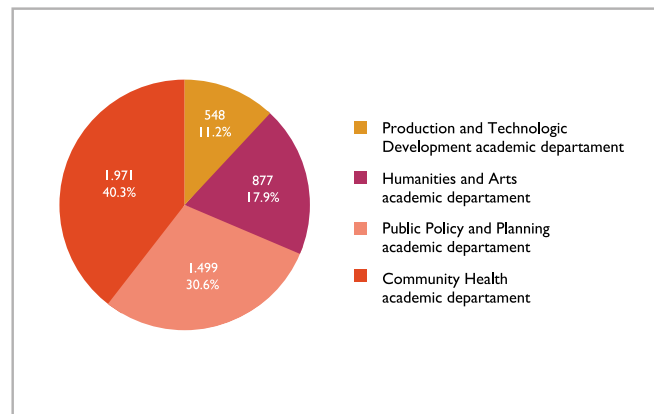

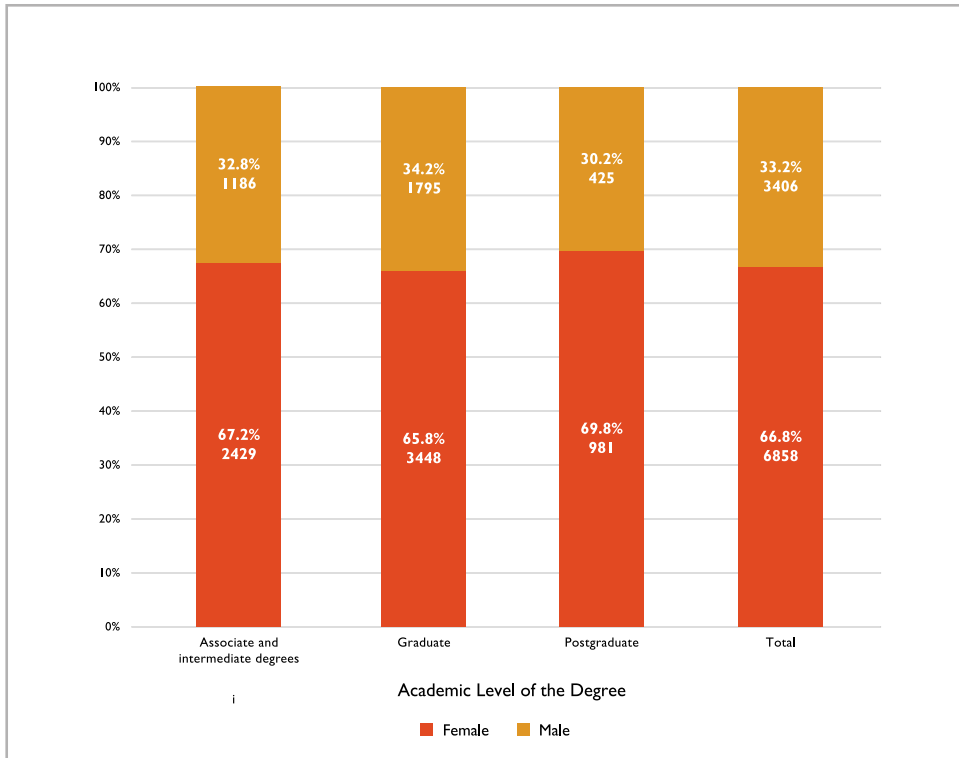

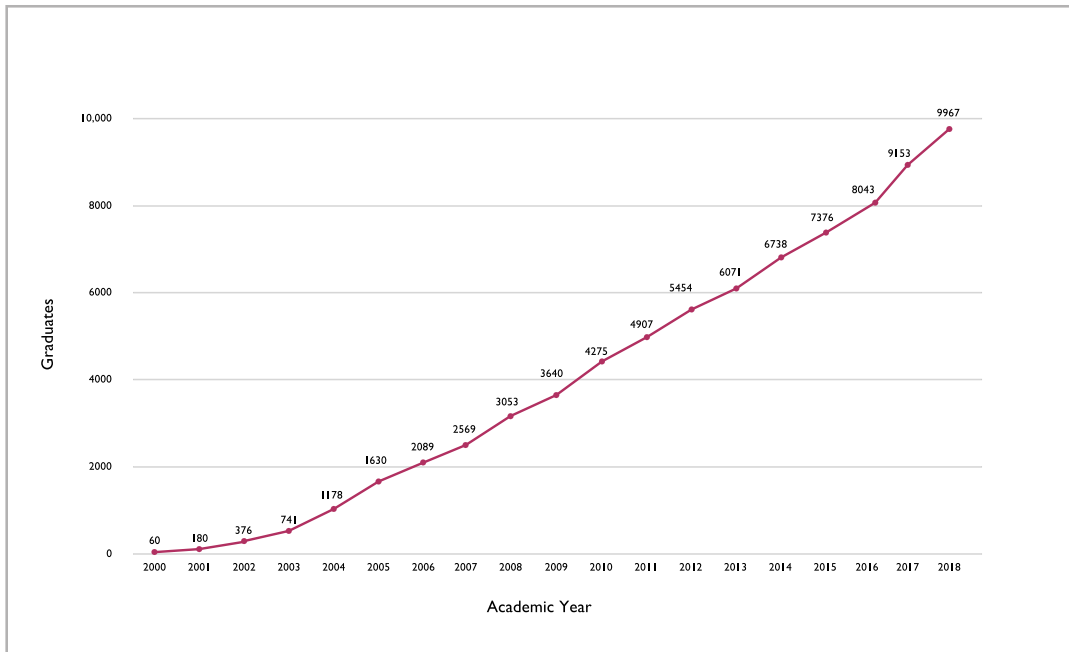
Graph 15: Distribution of graduates who hold diplomas issued by academic level of the degree and sex.

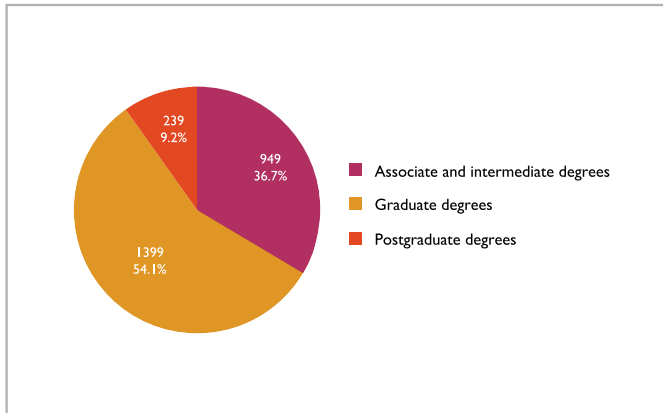

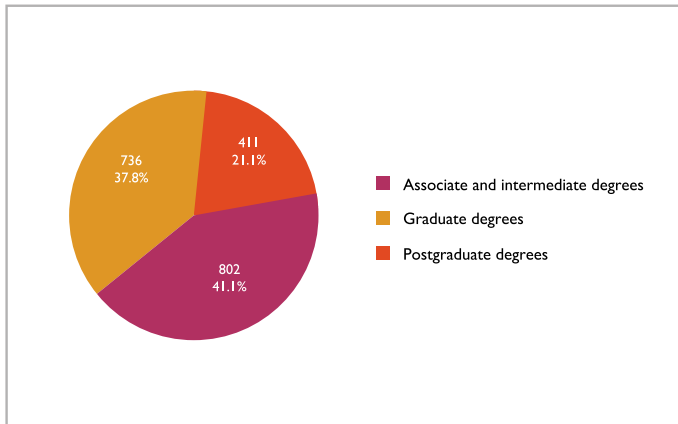

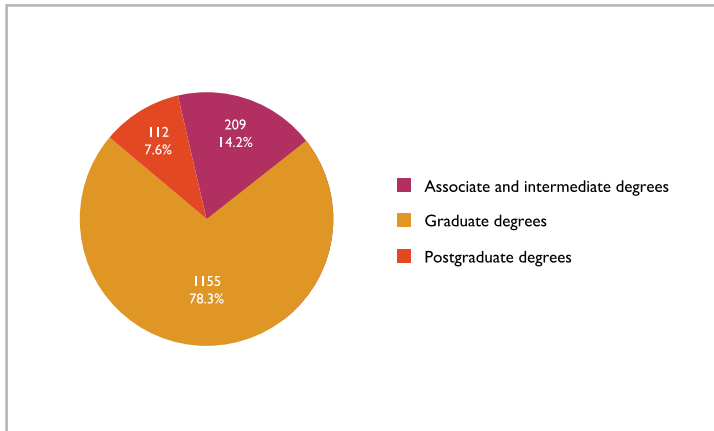

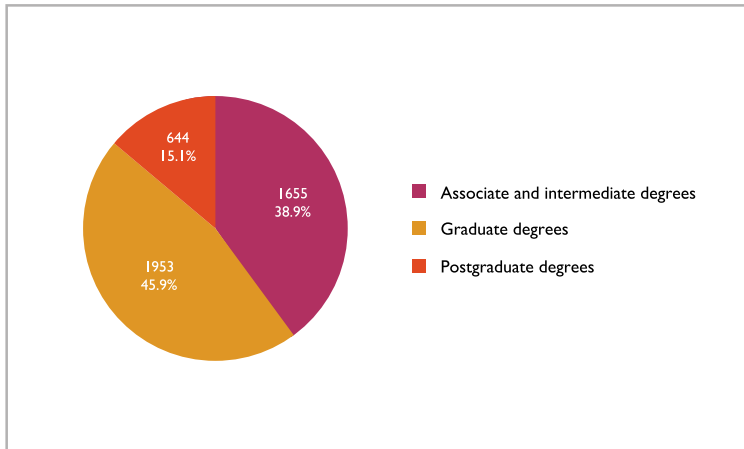

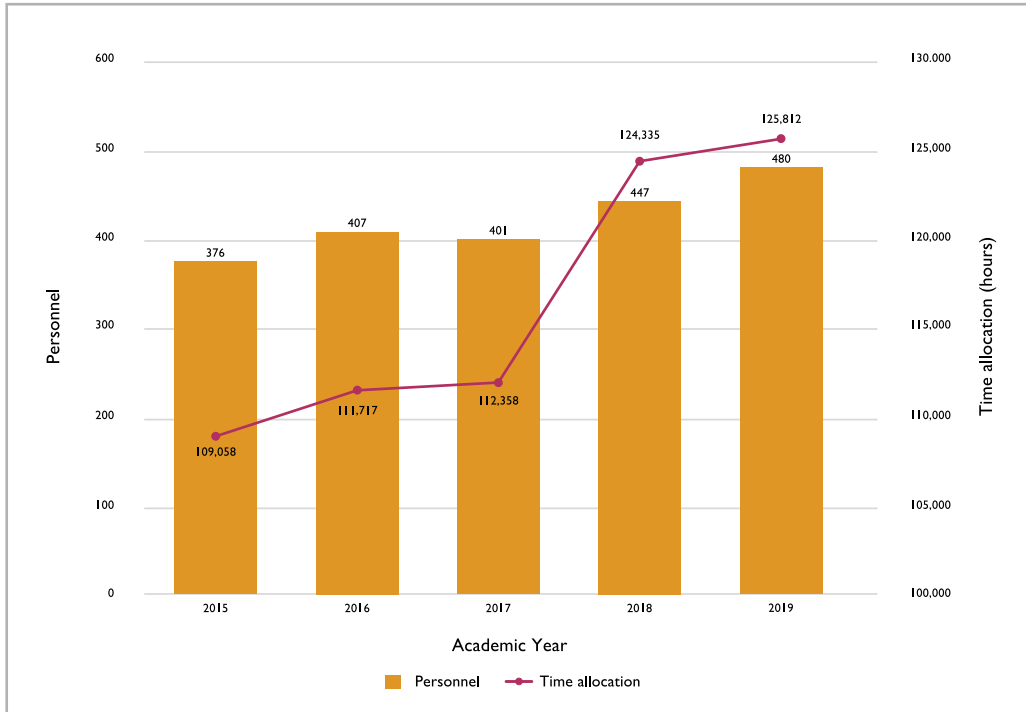

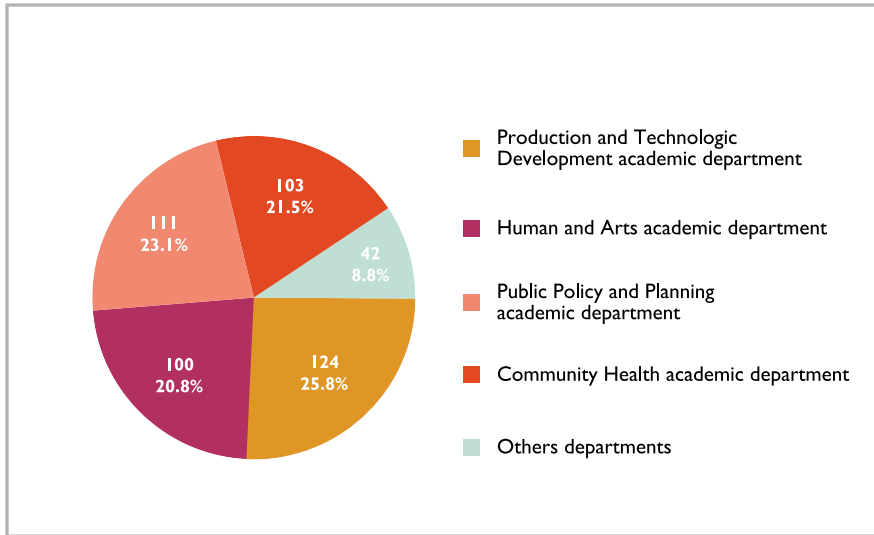

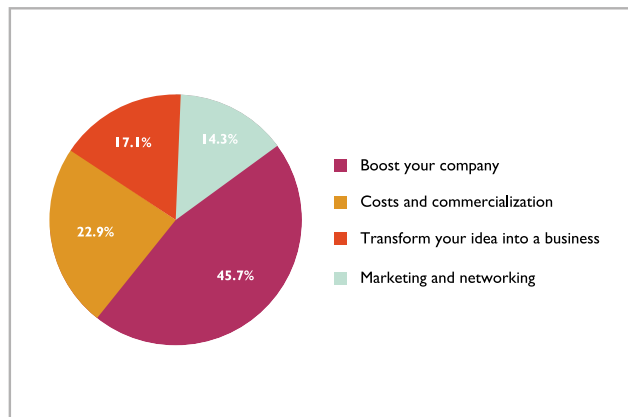

Graph 23: Entrepreneurs trained at UNLa's venture center distribution by type of training².Year 2019.



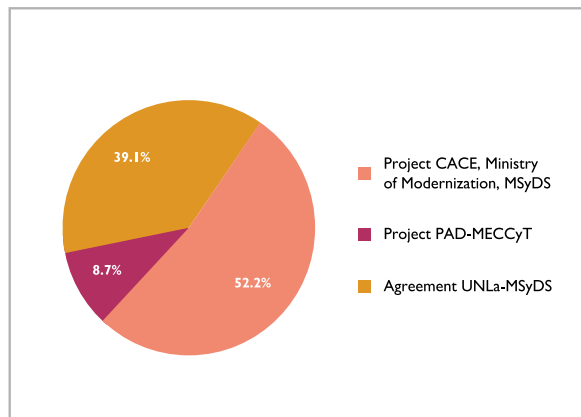

Graph 24: Distribution of entrepreneurs given technical advice by UNLa's venture center by project/agreement. Year 2019.



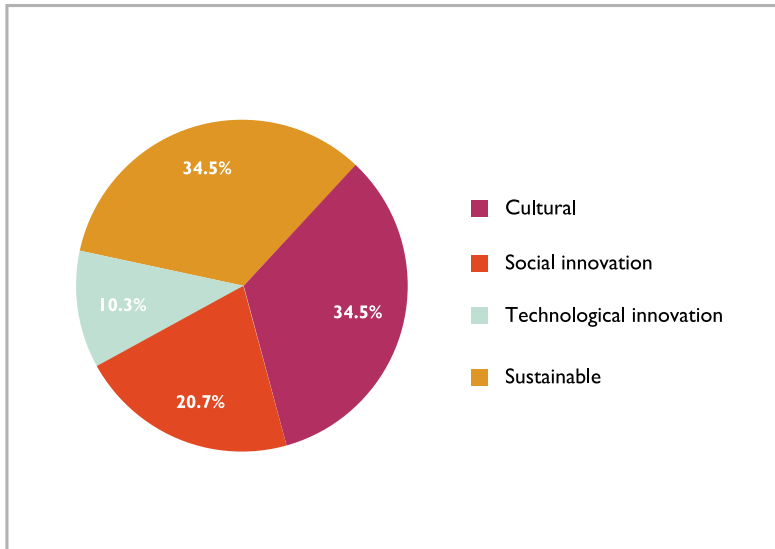

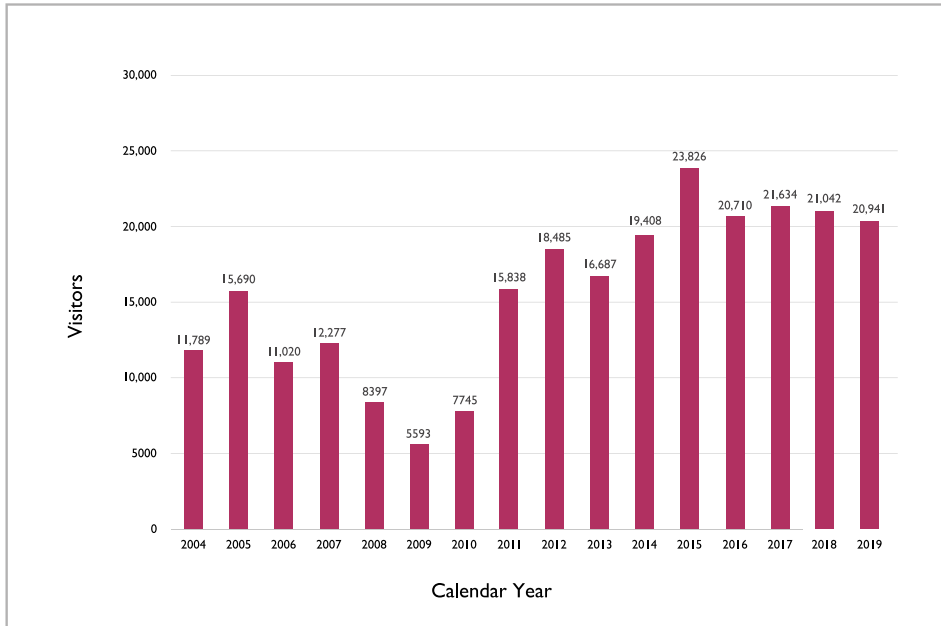

Graph 26:Visitors to the permanent exhibition of the Interactive Scientific and Technologic Center -Abremate- by calendar year.²



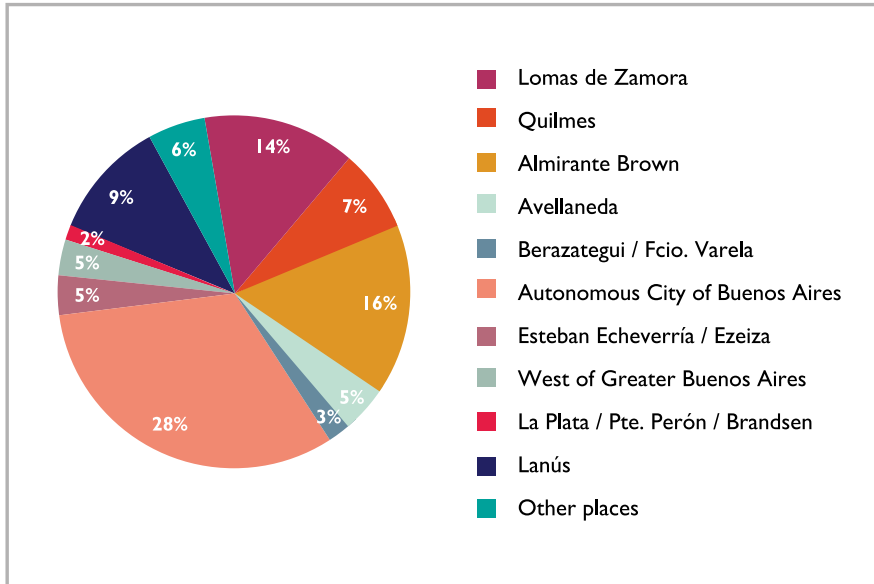

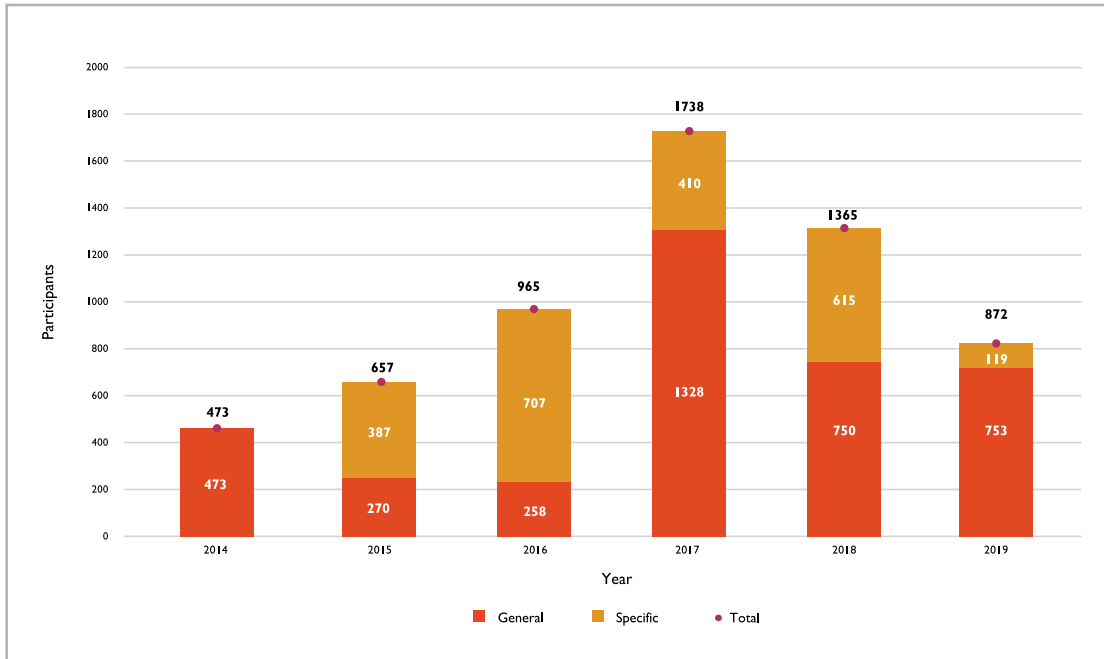

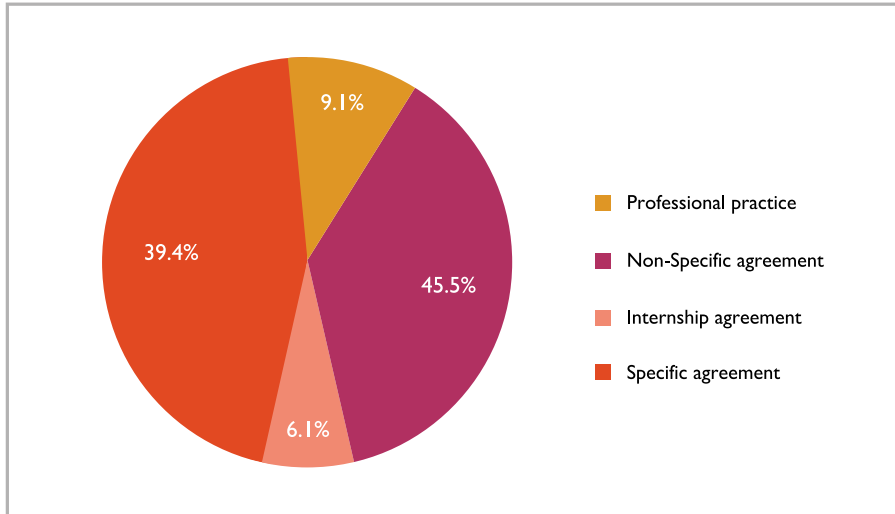

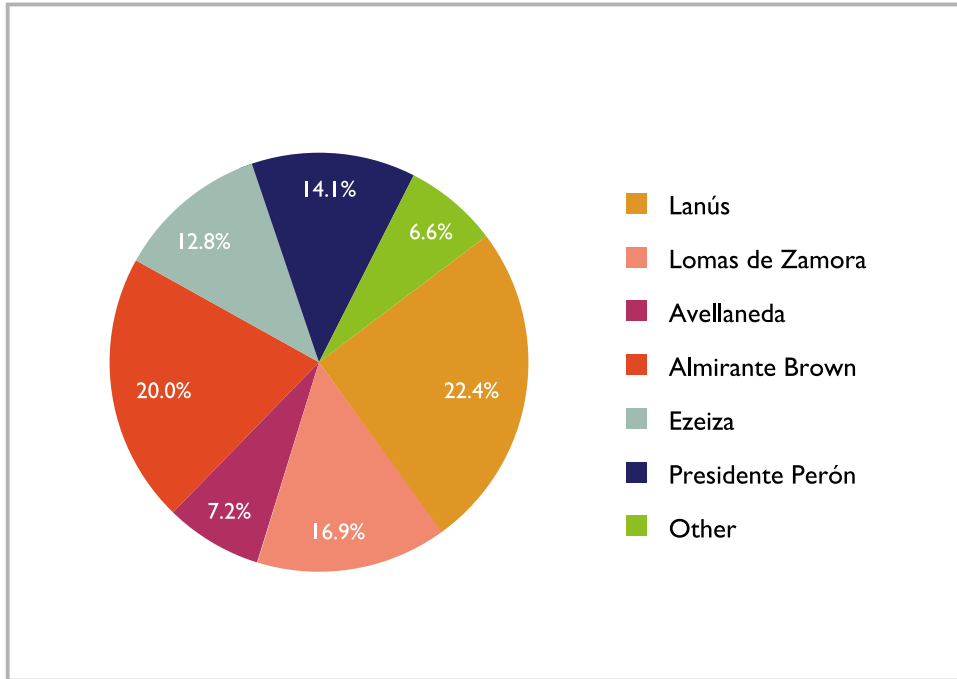

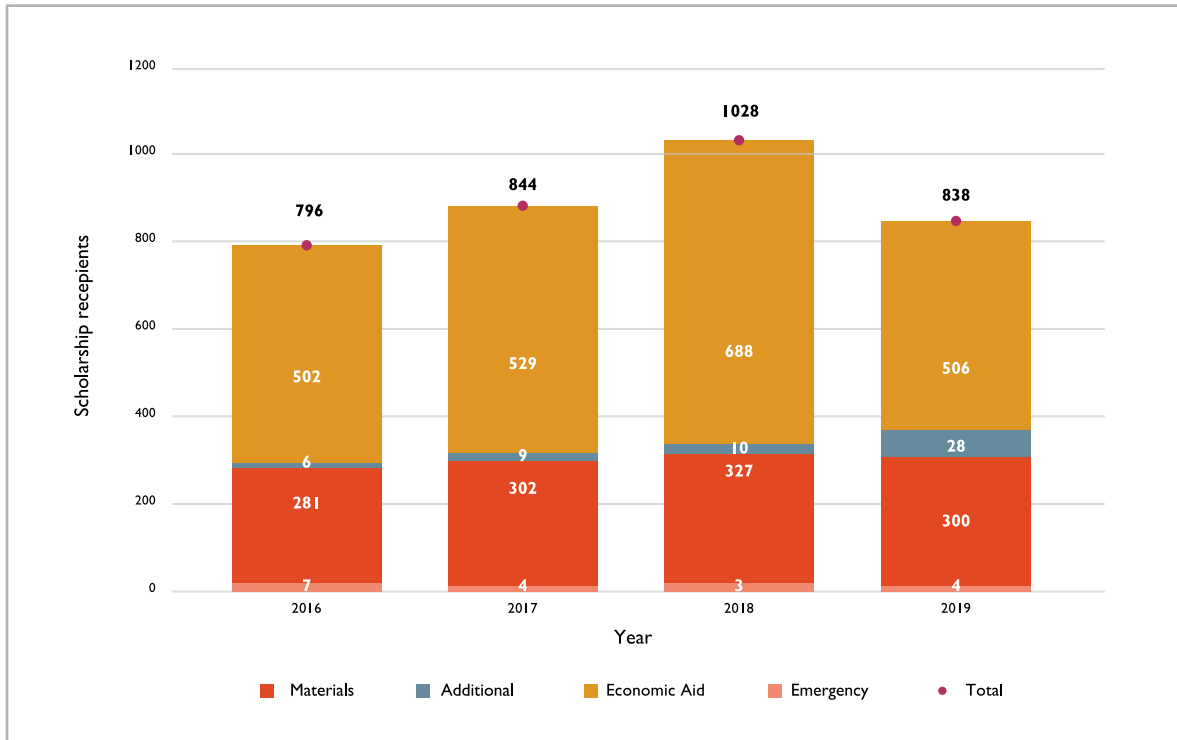

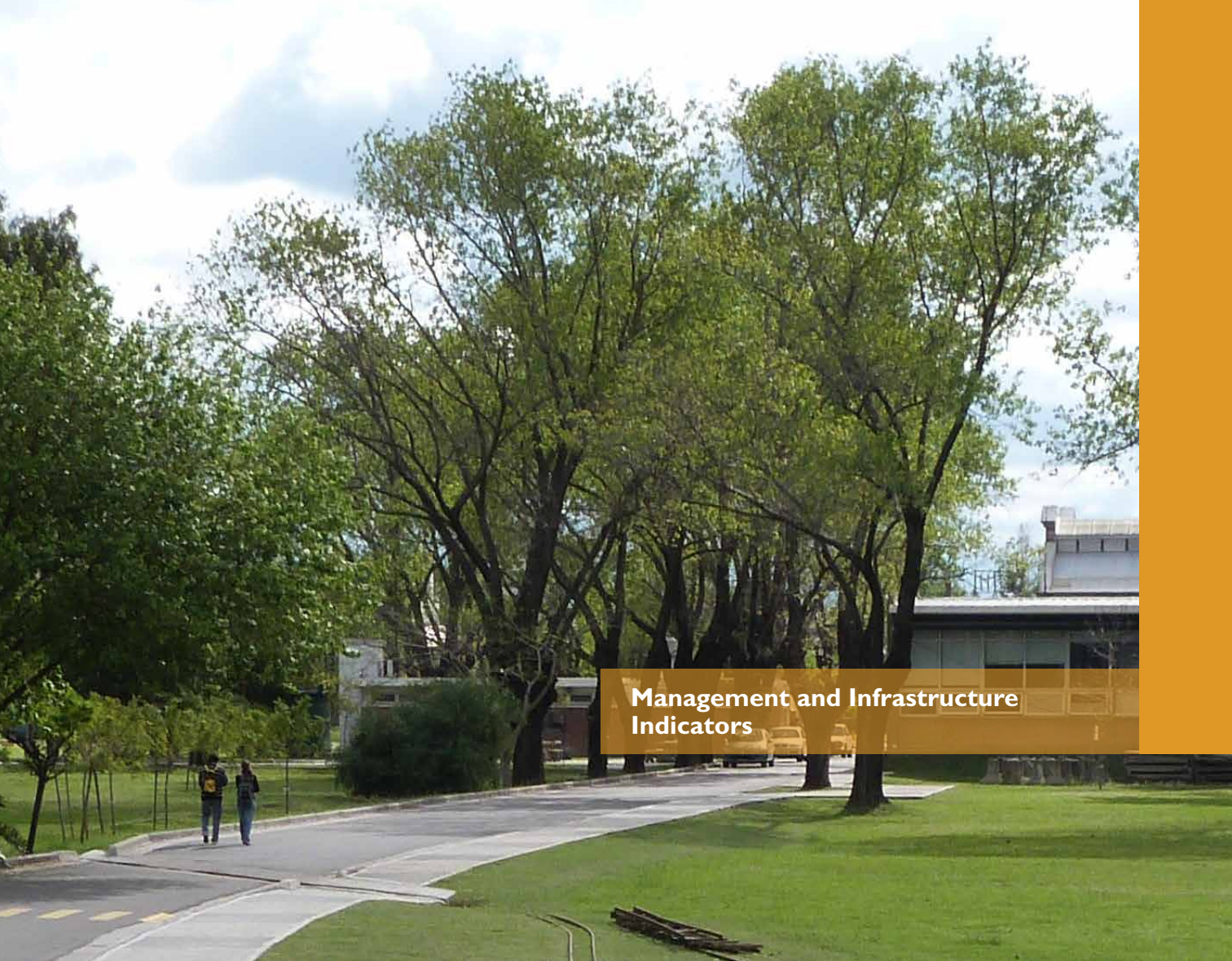

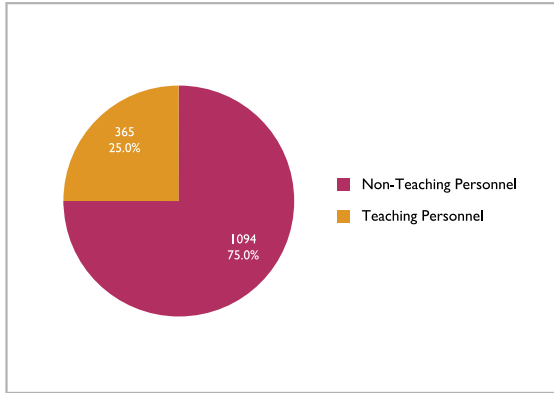

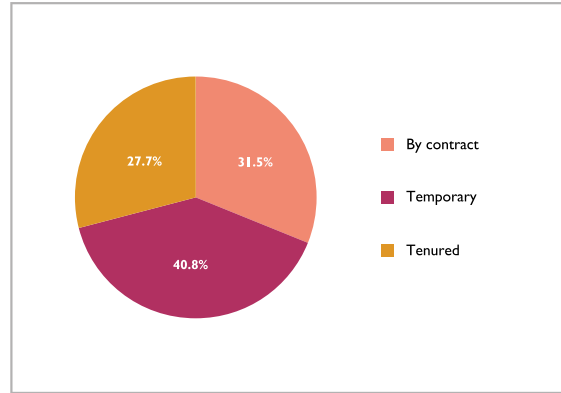

Graph 33: Distribution of Teaching and research personnel by contract type. Year 2018.

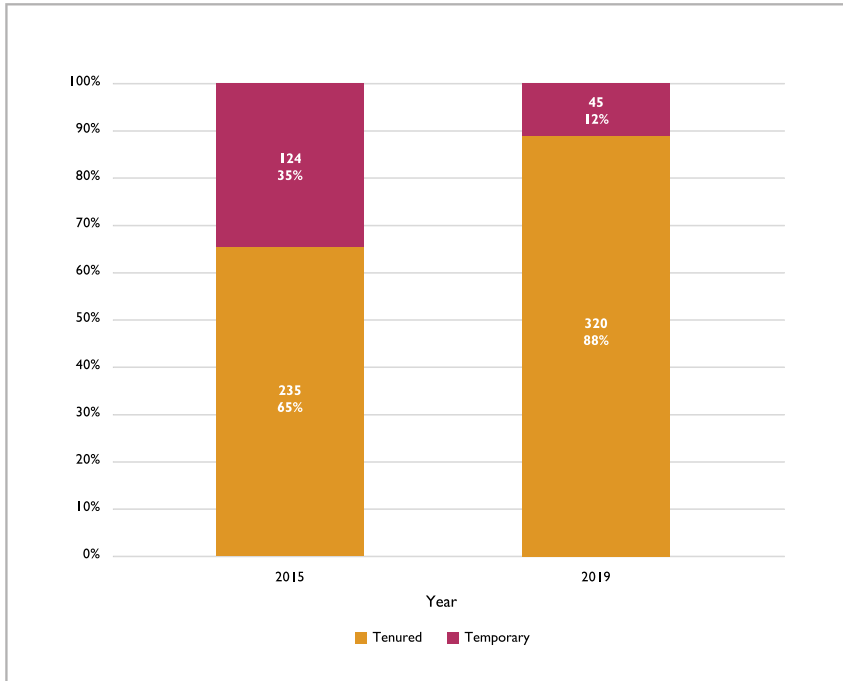

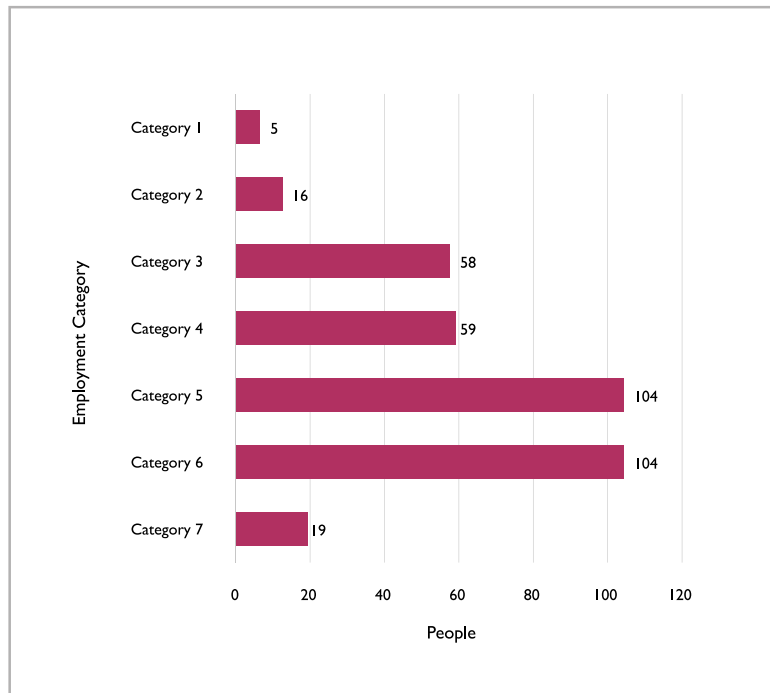

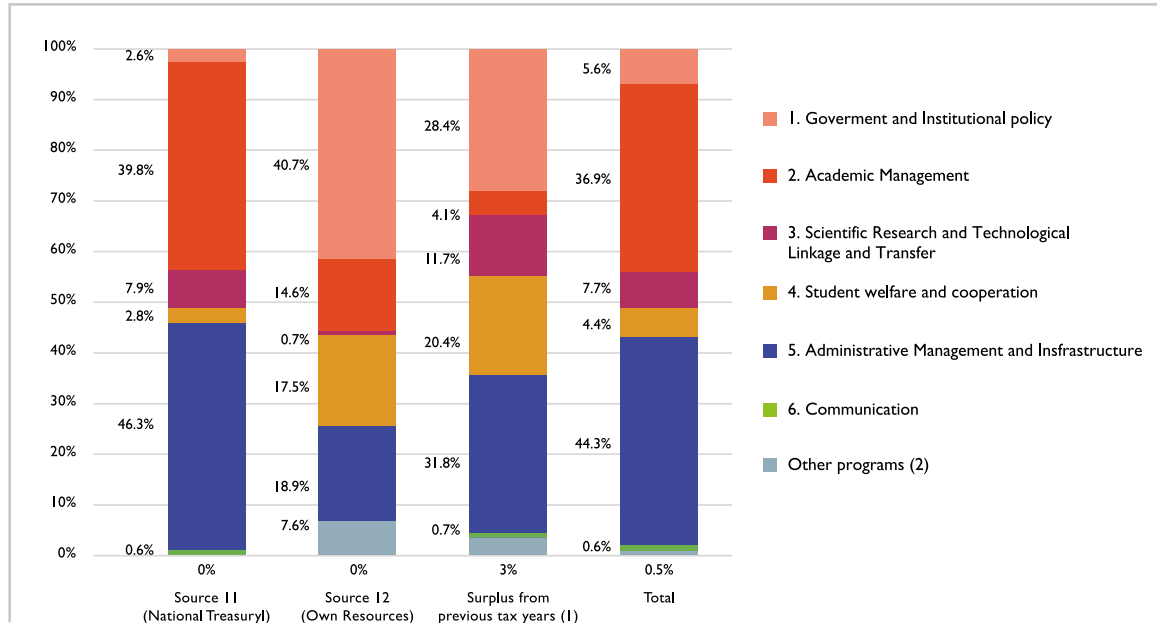

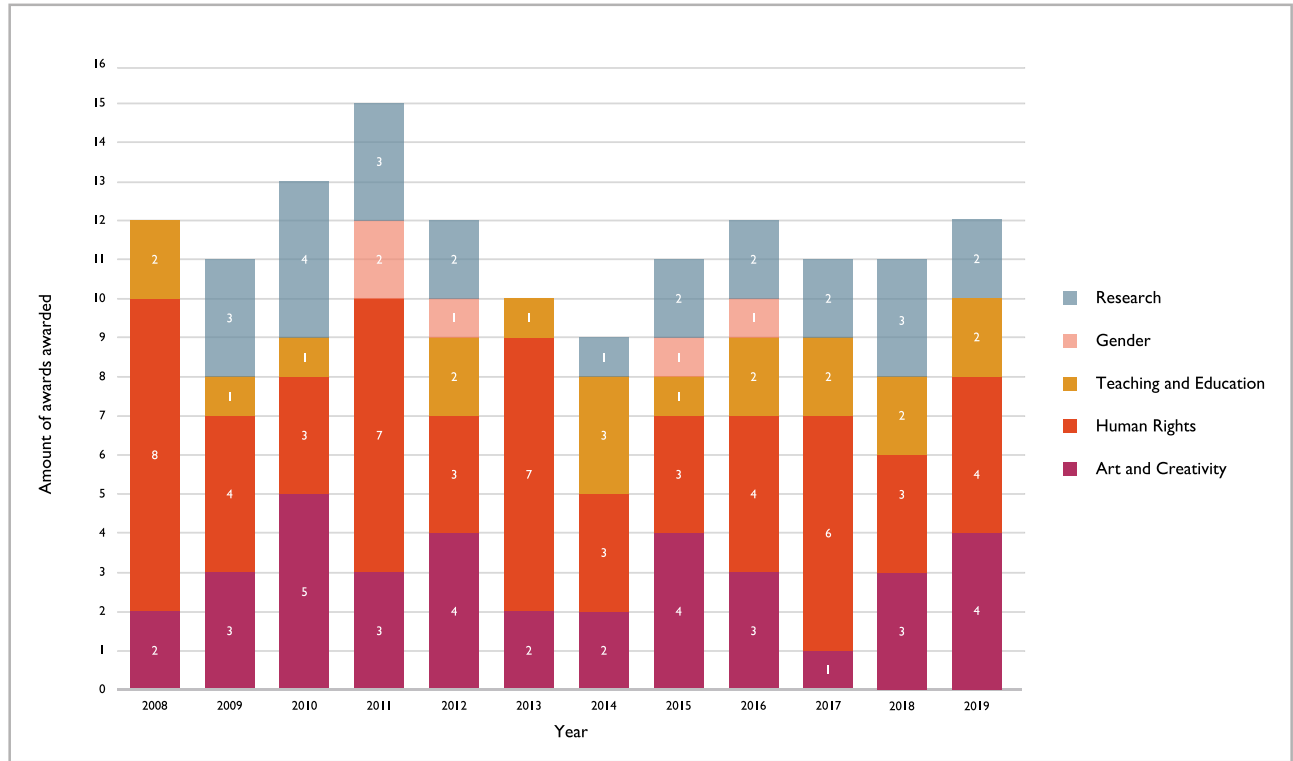
